There will be many things to consider as you plan your trip to Boston. It may feel overwhelming. Here are a few resources that may be helpful:

• Through the Vermont Family Network you can be matched, confidentially, with another parent that has shared similar experiences and/or diagnoses. Talking on the phone with a parent who has "been there" can offer a source of empathetic listening, hope, encouragement, and problem solving. Vermont Family Network connects families of children with special needs with other families for caring and support. Parents should never feel alone!

• Income-eligible families of children with special health needs (birth to 21) may apply for up to \$1,000 per 12 month period for their child's unmet medically necessary needs such as equipment, medications, travel, and therapies.

• Through the Children with Special Health Needs, you can be connected with a Medical Social Worker (MSW). There are 10 MSW's that cover the state of VT. You will be connected with a MSW based on where you live. In addition to offering resources and supports, a MSW can also help with Medicaid Insurance.

Medicaid Insurance

A Medical Social Worker can help you start or complete an application to determine eligibility for Medicaid. A family may receive Medicaid insurance based on either income or disability.

- <u>Dr. Dynosaur</u> is determined based on household income greenmountaincare.org/health-plans/dr-dynasaur
- <u>Katie Beckett</u> (also referred to as <u>DCHC</u> Disabled Children's Home Care) is determined based on the condition/disability of the child and income of the child (and will only begin after the birth of the child).

If completing Katie Beckett prior to your child being born, you can fill out most of the application and bring it with you to finish after the birth of your child. You can include reports from surgeons, doctors and nurses that can support the need for Medicaid coverage.

Additional ways someone can qualify for Medicaid can be found in VFN's Six Ways to Access Medicaid. Search on <u>vermontfamilynetwork.org</u> Navigate to: Accessing Health Care, Six Ways to Access Medicaid.

Travel Expenses

In addition to insurance coverage, Medicaid may also be able to help with some of the expenses incurred with travel to and from Boston. For example, Medicaid may help with the cost of gas, food expenses and lodging. In order to access this, you will need to ask your child's pediatrician to complete an: Out-of-area/Out-of-State Transportation
Referral Form. dvha.vermont.gov/for-providers/transportation
Keep all receipts so that you can be reimbursed. Medicaid will only reimburse a food receipt that is itemized, they will not reimburse a receipt that only has the total amount of the meal on it.

Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA)

You may be eligible for FMLA through your place of employment. FMLA allows for 12 weeks of unpaid time off to care for an immediate family member that has a serious health condition, without jeopardizing your employment status. Medical Social Worker-Boston Children's Hospital

Each unit of the hospital will have Medical Social Workers, similar to a MSW that you may be connected with in VT. You can ask for a MSW once you are admitted to Boston Children's. Here are a few things a MSW can assist you with:

- Family and Medical Leave Act paperwork
- Hard conversations and emotional support
- Financial resources: There are often times grant(s) that your family may be eligible for which can greatly help offset the cost of being in Boston
- Meal vouchers based on income
- Hospital happenings such as: special dinners, massage, music therapy, Reiki, meditation, yoga etc.



Traveling to Boston Children's Hospital (BCH)...

Is located at 300 Longwood Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts (MA). The traffic in the Longwood medical area is congested between 7-9 AM and 4-6 PM. If you are driving and have early appointments, leave adequate time for travel and parking.

From the North:

- Via Interstate 93, take Storrow Drive westbound
- Exit at the Fenway, Route 1 South
- Follow signs for Boylston Street, Outbound and bear right on Boylston Street.
- At 4th traffic light, bear left on Brookline Avenue
- At 2nd traffic light, turn left on Longwood Avenue
- The main entrance to BCH is the 2nd right

From the West:

- Via the Massachusetts Turnpike, take Exit 18 and get on Storrow Drive eastbound towards Boston
- Exit at the Fenway, Route 1 South
- Follow signs for Boylston Street, Outbound and bear right on Boylston Street
- At the 4th traffic light, bear left on Brookline Avenue
- At 2nd traffic light, turn right on Longwood Avenue
- The main entrance to BCH is the 2nd right

Or

- Via 128 (I-95), take Exit 20/ Route 9 East
- At Brookline Village intersection, turn left on Brookline Avenue
- At 6th light turn right on Longwood Avenue
- The main entrance to BCH is the second right

Parking:

Locations: Parking is available in the Children's Hospital Garage on Blackfan Street directly across from the main entrance. Patients and their families are eligible for a discounted rate. Validation of your parking ticket is available at the reception desk in the hospital lobby. *Please note:* The parking garage will not fit a mid-size SUV with a Thule or carrier on top of the vehicle. If the extra storage is needed, you will need to park in valet parking or find additional parking at a different location.

Cost: With a validated ticket, the maximum fee is \$10.00 per 24 hours. Valet parking is also available at the main entrance for \$15.00 (\$10.00 with a handicapped placard). Parking passes are available to purchase at the Employee Parking Office which is located in the parking garage. You can purchase 6 days and get the 7th day for free (\$70 valued pass for \$60). These passes can be purchased Monday-Friday. Parking programs are available for inpatient families. See your social worker for details.

Where to Stay in Boston...

Accommodations in Boston are very expensive. When added to the cost of travel and meals, families can find the experience financially challenging. BCH has developed affordable housing options for patient families. The best option for you will depend on several variables, including the number of people traveling with you, the anticipated length of stay, and your own need for company vs. privacy. No Charge: 26 additional sleep spaces and several shower facilities are available for parents of patients in the Medical/Surgical Intensive Care Unit (MICU), Newborn Intensive Care Unit (NICU), and Cardiac Intensive Care Unit (CICU). Some of the sleep-rooms can sleep two parents, but they are proprietary for NICU parents as they cannot stay bedside. Children are not allowed to stay in the sleep spaces.

Sleep spaces are available on a first-come, first-served basis for parents of patients in the ICUs. Parents can request a sleep space room or shower access in the Hale Family Center For Families which is located in the main lobby of BCH next to the Au Bon Pain restaurant.

Private room with twin bed; linens provided Shared bathrooms in hospital for parents with a child in ICU Communal kitchen, Laundry facilities Wi-Fi access The Surgical Intensive Care Unit (SICU) and the Cardiac Intensive Care Unit (CICU) also have a bed available in the baby's room. The Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) does not. The ICU is not the most relaxing place to sleep and families often find they need a place away from the unit to relax. But if you would like to be close to your child, you should know that there is the option in the SICU and CICU for one parent to sleep at bedside. Once the child transfers to the floor one parent may stay at bedside. (The floor is also called the step-down unit, a child will be moved here when he/she is stable and no longer requiring intense care, but will still have 24 hour nursing, and you will be one step closer to going home!)




Suggestions for what to pack:

- Laundry detergent (pods are very easy to travel with). Detergent is not sold in hospital and is expensive at the CVS
- Tide to Go Instant Stain Remover in case you need to do a quick wash of something in your room
- Comfortable clothes
- Sneakers
- Slippers to wear in the room or slip on shoes; great when you need to get up quick
- Warm clothes (ICU can be cold)
- Brink your Vermont Family Network Care Notebook or a note book to write things down and also a good place to put any questions that you have so you can be ready for doctors/nurses
- Baby wipes-hospital uses dry pads that you have to wet with water. If you prefer wipes then it would be best to bring a package with you

Meeting Mother's Needs at Brigham and Women's Hospital (BWH)...

Some expecting mothers travel to BCH for fetal intervention or for the care of their baby immediately following delivery. Whether the transfer of mother's care is temporary or for the duration of the pregnancy, providers in Maternal-Fetal Medicine at BWH specialize in the care and delivery of high risk pregnancies and they partner with BCH for fetal interventions.

Registration: 866-489-4056

In order to transfer your care, you must first register at BWH. They are a separate hospital and have their own registration process. No appointment can be scheduled for obstetrical care until you have registered. Please call the number below with your insurance information. At the end of the call, they will give you a registration number.

Scheduling Appointments at BWH:

The department of Maternal - Fetal Medicine at BWH schedules its own appointments. Please have your BWH registration number when you call.

Getting to BWH:

BWH is located at 75 Francis Street, Boston, MA. There is valet parking at the main entrance or patient parking at 70 Francis Street, Boston.

Getting to BWH from the AFCC: BWH is connected to BCH by an indoor bridge. To reach BWH from the AFCC, turn right out of the AFCC and follow the hall through the sliding doors, upstairs and cross the bridge into BWH. See map below.

- To Maternal-Fetal Medicine: turn left on the Pike, take elevators on left to the 3rd floor.
- **To OB Admitting:** turn right on the Pike, take stairs on right to ground floor. Admitting is past escalator on right.
- To Triage/Labor and Delivery: turn left on the Pike, take elevators on left to 1st floor. Ask security to release elevator to 5th floor. Nursing desk is straight ahead as you come off elevators.

Birthing and Lactation Supports

Whether you are at BWH recovering from having your baby, or at BCH with your baby, breast pumps, lactation rooms and Lactation Consultants are all available.

Breast Pumps are available throughout the hospital. You can ask the staff at the check-in desk on the unit where you child is staying to check out a breast pump. All pumps are hospital grade. You can ask for a starter kit that will give you all new tubing and the essentials you'll need to use the pump, (there is also a lactation vending machine located just outside of Au Bon Pain next to the elevators). The pumps are a first-come first-serve and if in high demand, you may need to wait until one is available. If you can arrange to have a personal pump with you, that will cut down on your wait time. If your family is outpatient, the starter kit is at cost for \$50.

Lactation Rooms are located throughout the hospital. If comfortable, you can pump in your child's room, each room has a curtain that separates the sleep space.

Lactation Consultants are available to support nursing moms. You can ask your child's nurse or social worker to help in setting that up.

Doula Birthing Support

If you were considering a Doula's support for the birth of your child, you can still have this support at the hospital. BCH and BWH do not provide Doulas, but you can find Doulas in the area that are willing to travel to the hospital to provide birthing support. A few resources include:

Child Life Specialists

617-355-6551

Child Life Specialists enhance a patient's emotional, social and cognitive growth during a hospital stay, giving special consideration to each child's family, culture and stage of development. Using developmental interventions and play, they help patients and families adjust to and understand the hospital and their medical situation. Child Life Specialists:

- Help patients develop ways to cope with fear, anxiety, separation and adjustment to the hospital experience
- Provide consultation to the health care team regarding developmental and psycho-social issues
- Provide preparation and individualized support before and after medical procedures
- Facilitate developmentally appropriate play, including medical play, at the bedside, in activity rooms and in clinic areas
- Initiate tutoring services

You can ask for a Child Life Specialist if one has not visited your child during your stay. They can bring toys and activities to engage your child and keep them occupied as they recover or during medical treatments. Chaplaincy 617-355-6363

Chaplains are in the hospital every day from 8 am to 5 pm and available after hours for emergencies. Ask for a chaplain to be paged. A nurse can also page for you.

Interfaith Chapel 617-355-6664

Located on Farley 1 near the Cashier's Office, is a peaceful interfaith chapel and it is always open. You and your family are welcome to use this quiet space for your own prayer or meditation. Rosaries, electric Sabbath candles, prayer rugs and cushions, and scriptures in many languages are available upon request.

In addition, the chapel hosts regular weekly observances and services on special religious holidays. These include Catholic mass, Sabbath candle-lightings, and Buddhist meditation. (A current listing of service times is posted near the chapel door.) The Muslim chaplain can provide directions to local institutions for Friday prayer, Ramadan, and other holy days.

MBTA: Take Green Line from Longwood to Park Street. Change to Red Line towards Braintree. Take train to South Station. Exit South Station to the right of the Amtrak Sales window, to the left of the Commuter Rail platforms onto Summer Street. Take a right onto Summer Street and walk one block towards the water. Take the first left on Dorchester Avenue. Follow Dorchester Avenue one block and turn right over the Congress Street Bridge. At the stoplight, turn right onto Congress Street and proceed across the bridge. You'll see the Museum ahead on your left, behind the 40-foot milk bottle. It's about a three-block walk.

Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum

Housed in a stunning 15th-century Venetian-style palace surrounding a sun- and flower-filled courtyard, the Museum provides an unusual backdrop for viewing of art. The Gardner Museum's collection contains more than 2,500 paintings, sculptures, tapestries, furniture, manuscripts, rare books and decorative arts.

MBTA: Take the Green Line "E" train from Longwood to Museum of Fine Arts. Cross Huntington Avenue to Louis Prang Street. Walk down Louis Prang Street for two blocks. The Museum is on left.

John F Kennedy Library and Museum Columbia Point, Boston jfklibrary.org

Museum portrays the life, leadership, and legacy of President Kennedy, conveys his enthusiasm for politics and public service, and illustrates the nature of the office of the President.

MBTA: Take Green Line from Longwood to Park Street. Change to Red Line towards Braintree. Take train to JFK/UMass. There is a free shuttle bus to the Library every 20 min. beginning at 8:00 a.m. and running until Museum closing. Take the buses marked 'JFK.'

Located adjacent to the USS Constitution, the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world, this museum offers hands-on exhibits, displays of historic artifacts, and computer simulated re-enactments.

MBTA: Take Green Line from Longwood to North Station. Walk east on Causeway Street towards the Zakim Bridge/North End. At 1st light (N. Washington Street), turn left and cross the Charlestown Bridge. Follow Freedom Trail Red line to Charlestown Navy Yard. Enter through Gate 1. Museum is in Bldg 22.

Starting at the Boston Common, it takes visitors through downtown Boston, the North End and Charlestown.
